In 1930 a charter was issued. In 1932 the first 12 residents moved into a home at 1805 Virginia Avenue in Hagerstown, MD, known as Homewood. In 1951 a new home with accommodations for 58 residents opened in Williamsport, MD.

The Homewood Administration has always looked forward to the future and accommodating the needs of future residents.

Here we are in 2019 experiencing more growing pains. As the administration did 87 years ago, we have to have faith and trust and enjoy our wonderful community. I heard on TV today "nine times out of ten the things we worry about never happen."

# **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

Recently, there has been a welcome coolness in the air to prepare us for a new season! I love the fall season with the traditional colors and tastes that we all can share. Along with the change in seasons, I am sharing campus news and updates.

The landscaping and trees along Pearson Boulevard will be completed at the end of our Phase 8 construction. This allows large equipment to come onto Pearson and not damage the plantings.

The State of Maryland Styrofoam Ban will go into effect July 1, 2020. Our corporate purchaser is currently researching alternative supplies through our vendors.

The Hearing Loop project proposal has been presented to the Resident Council for their consideration to fund the project.

I am currently interviewing applicants for the Food Service Director position. I expect to have the person selected in place by October.

Our next RLEEF event is Saturday, October 5<sup>th</sup> featuring the Frederick Symphony Orchestra. We continue our 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration with beautiful music and a surprise. Please see posters for time and location.

There was discussion about residents having difficulty at the Motor Vehicle Administration (MVA) while applying for a driver's license. The MVA did not recognize Homewood as a residential community. We will begin to place a letter in all new move-in materials to help those who may encounter this.

Key Court Grand Opening is scheduled for Friday, November 1<sup>st</sup> from 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM.

With help from one of our residents, we are in touch with a professional putting green installer. He plans to visit our campus and look at a good location for a putting green. He will also give us his thoughts on the pickle ball court. There are plans to convert it to a bocce ball and shuffleboard court.

There was good discussion on fire drills and evacuations in the apartment buildings. Greg is aware of the request for a more formalized fire/evacuation drill for The Lodge. There are four stairs in The Lodge to be used in the event of evacuation or elevator repair.

KONE, an elevator company, has been in to inspect and adjust The Lodge elevators.

We are still working on the completion of some capital projects for 2019, landscaping the chapel and Willows Courtyard.

Update on spraying campus areas: The spraying that took place September 3rd was fertilizer which is why some experienced a smell after application. Also, there is new organic weed killer being used on campus, not Round-Up.

Recently there was a person on campus representing a 2020 Census Taker. We have contacted the U.S. Census and requested that anytime there is a person assigned to visit our campus we

will be notified in advance. As always, if there is someone at your door that you are not expecting or is not with a Homewood co-worker, please do not open your door. We will be using Onecall to make notice of such visits as soon as possible.

## MARY CATHERINE BRAKE AND AVADNA COGHILL

Visionaires, a Homewood support group for blind or low-vision residents, was founded by Mary Catherine Brake at Homewood back in 2005. For the past 14 years, Visionaires has been a beacon of light for people dealing with the physical and emotional challenges of blindness or low vision.

Visionaires is a supportive and compassionate group that shares common vision challenges and resources. They host a wide variety of speakers, including an optometrist and a person who works with guide dogs, among other speakers. "We've even had the chaplain talk about the emotional challenges of vision loss. This is important because it is very hard to realize that you are losing your sight. Any

loss of ability is hard, so it's been enormously helpful to have guidance

and to learn so much about the help that is available," says Mary Catherine.

Avadna Coghill, also a Homewood resident, is legally blind. She took over leading the Visionaires in 2014 in the hopes of keeping it around Homewood. She says her biggest challenge when she first began losing her sight was giving up reading. Once an avid reader, she now listens to books on tape offered free of charge through the mail through the Maryland State Library. Avadna has made adaptations that make living with blindness easier. One trick she uses is putting safety pins in the waistband of her pants to help identify the color to coordinate her outfits. "One for dark blue, 2 for green, 3 for red. If there are no pins, the pants are black" says

Avadna. Her grandson gave her an electronic virtual assistant called Alexa. When instructed, Alexa can play music, play audiobooks, and provide weather, sports, and other real time information, like the news.

She says she can only see shadows, but can identify people she knows by their shape and how they walk. "It's always helpful when they announce themselves, and say something like, 'Hi Avadna, it's Sherry. "

Attendance at Visionaires meetings is free and open to all Homewood residents and the larger Frederick community. Everyone is welcome! The group meets the first Tuesday of the month (expect for July and August, when they take a summer break) at 10:30 AM in the Gardenview Room at Crumland Farms. Refreshments are served.

# **BAKER PARK CARILLON**

A bell's not a bell 'til you ring it. A song's not a song 'til you sing it. Love in your heart wasn't put there to stay. Love isn't love 'til you give it away! Oscar Hammerstein (7-12-1895 to 8-23-1960)

If you look at the photo of Joseph Dill Baker (4-2-1845 to 10-6-1938), in *The History of Frederick County From The Earliest*, Vol. 2, page 710,

you would hardly guess that he is responsible for the carillon that bears his name, or the sentiment "A bell's not a bell 'til you ring it." If you consider J.D. Baker's legacy, it is appropriate to equate the love in his heart to the money in his bank account that he gave to his home town. He gave it away for Baker Park and the carillon.

J.D. Baker forfeited an opportunity to be Governor of Maryland due to his views on temperance (he opposed the sale of alcohol), and he was ahead of his time on the issue of integration (he opposed segregation).

Specific details about the J.D. Baker Carillon are given in an article written by Terry Higgins in the June, 2018 *The Chatter* (pg. 15 of 16).

If you want to dig deeper into the subject of carillons vis-à-vis pipe organs, (since it seems they had similar origins despite the differences in keyboards), it is interesting to find at least two instances where each is located: 1) Longwood Gardens in Pennsylvania and 2) Foreman Organ and Carillon in Simsbury, Connecticut.

The book traces the origin of carillons from the bells of the Bronze-Age (3000BCE) in China, across the silk road to Italy, and beyond (via the Benedictine order of the Roman Catholic Church) and ultimately into the present era.

It is amusing to imagine a bronze age smithy dropping a bronze goblet intended for the Emperor, only to hear a bell tone, and then holding it upside down and striking it with a hammer to repeat the sound. It was the beginning of bells and carillons.
